More Ashes than Munchkins

For a number of years now, there has been a growing movement in the Episcopal Church as we seek ever increasing ways to reach out into communities. "Ashes to Go" invites (well, maybe challenges) clergy and lay folks to get up and out early on Ash Wednesday to set-up signs and set-aside traditional views of private practicing of faith. More and more patrons of train stations and commuter lots are being offered the opportunity to receive prayers and ashes as they make their way onto public transportation as they head to work. As is true with most things in the Episcopal Church, the voices line up on both sides of this movement with just as many staying silent and ignoring it all together.

I am among those who viewed Ashes to Go with a bit of suspicion. How could marking someone's ashes with a few words of prayer as they rush to get on a bus be a meaningful way to begin Lent? What about the confession? What about all the beautiful and powerful words of our liturgy that wash over us in the gathered community in worship? Can you really just pick up that one little piece out of the whole? I wasn't sure ...

The simple truth is that it is not the same and it doesn't do the same thing. It can't ... and it doesn't. But at the same time, others who have done it say that it is worth doing.

So, after a couple years of talking about it and false starts St. Alban's participated in Ashes to Go by setting up our table on the edge of the commuter lot across from Franklin Avenue Middle School in what is known as the VFW lot.

We learned a number of things on our first outing. By 6:30 AM we were all prepared with signs, handouts, a table with doughnuts and coffee, the ashes, and (thanks to Dave Ludwig) hand and foot warmers! At first the looks were curious as commuters followed their daily ritual of waiting in their cars until that magic and unheralded moment when all the doors suddenly open and they all, seemingly at once, march like rows of ants toward the spot where the just spotted bus pulls to the sidewalk. But one woman did come over to us with a huge smile and engaged in an extended conversation about how great she thought this was and how it meant so much to her to be able to 'get ashes' because she didn't think she was going to be able to. That was the first ... but by no means the last. Person after person came with similar comments and thankfulness. I could feel our little group gaining energy and confidence with each encounter. And not everyone stopped ... but, we brought smiles and waves to that corner of God's Kingdom that morning. People driving past in their cars giving smiles and thumbs up. People commenting on what a great idea it was. People asking where the church is!!! Some stopped to tell us that they were going to their own church later that day and then we talked about where their faith home was.

At about 8 AM, just as the commuters were thinning out, the moms started driving through the lot after dropping their kids off at FAMS. And that was when a woman pulled over in her car and said "Wow, what a great idea! ... But do I have to get out of my car? I am in my pajamas!" She was laughing herself and we approached the car and did for her what we had done for the others ... we shared a moment of faith, prayer and connection. She was the first, but not the last. Over the next 10-15 minutes we repeated easily with others the marking, prayers and conversations that we had not known how to do just an hour and a half before. And interestingly, we shared lots of ashes, prayers, handouts, smiles and brief conversations. We shared very few doughnuts or cups of coffee. Prayers and ashes were enough.

So now, having done it, I realize that offering Ashes to Go does do something ... it does something significant ... and that something is worth doing.

What it does do is get us off of the top of the hill and bring us out to meet people where they are ... much like Jesus did when he walked around the hillsides and to the villages to teach, preach, and especially to meet people face to face. What it does is remind people that there are people who practice the faith in many different ways and that where ever they are on their faith journey they are welcome with us ... much like our parish mission statement of "Welcoming All to Share God's Love". What it does is gives people an experience of making their faith a part of their ordinary and everyday lives ... much like St. Francis taught to "Preach the Gospel at all times, when necessary use words" ... or in this case ashes.

I am thankful to Dave Ludwig, Cheri McCusker, Dean Mohamad and Sandy Dugan who each in their own way witnessed to me acts of faithful witness that cold March morning. You know, we clergy are not any different than anyone else. Just like you, I like to have people around me that care about the same things that I care about and it is easier to do something new if I have people to share it with. And that is just one of the countless blessings of the community of faith – companionship, fellowship and friendship. It was the best crossover into the journey of Lent that I have ever experienced. And I am so thankful for the companions on the way.

Ash Wednesday, 2015 is February 18th. So go ahead and mark your calendars now. We will meet at the parking lot across from FAMS and at the edge of the VFW. We'll have ashes, handouts, and toe warmers! but probably not coffee or doughnuts. Ashes and prayers are enough.


From Dave Ludwig



Table of Friends Luncheon a Blessed Afternoon

For the second time St. Alban's hosted our new ministry **Table for Friends** on Sunday March 9th. It was a St. Patrick's Day theme. Fifty residents of Spectrum for Living, a full service not-for-profit organization that provides developmentally disabled adults with a full range of life support, attended with 20 accompanying staff. Paula Hoffman, Chair of Outreach, spearheaded the event which saw 25+ members of St. Alban's participating. Everyone pitched in from setting up the space to making and serving the meal to as sitting with the activities to joining in with the singing. But most wonderful of all was the love, care and companionship given to each and every guest - especially by our children. They were amazing. We would be hard pressed to find a clearer sign of the welcome of Christ than was lived into fullness on that afternoon.

In future months we plan to expand Table for Friends to include clients from other residential programs in our area. There is one right here in Oakland with whom we have begun conversation. You may remember that at Christmas that some of the people we sponsored for gifts were from the Spectrum for Living family.

Kathryn has written and applied for a grant for seed money for Table for Friends and the All God's Children worship service (designed for very young children and those with special needs) through the Marge Christie fund for Congregational Development and it funds new and existing ministries in parishes that seek to extend the welcome and reach of Christ into the community - particularly to those most in need and under served - while fuller developing the ministry of the congregation. We have been notified that the grant has been accepted and assigned a liaison who will interview us. We will then defend the grant before the board later this spring. Determinations will be made in May for June distribution of funds. Our asking for this grant is \$1,500 for the 2014 cycle.

Our next Table for Friends will be held in June or July. The date is still pending. Please stay alert for more information and plan to join us in this new and fulfilling ministry. Talk with anyone who participated ... we are the ones who revved the biggest blessing!




